#### **PROCLAMATION**

#### RECOGNIZING INTERNATIONAL OVERDOSE AWARENESS DAY

WHEREAS, each year we lose thousands of people from drug overdose globally; and

WHEREAS, addition is a health condition and the discrimination associated with addiction must be addressed so that no one is stigmatized because of their health condition; and

WHEREAS, Borough of Roosevelt is not immune. You may have seen it happen to people around you. Tomorrow, it could happen to a loved one. This is not an invisible issue; and

WHEREAS, International Overdose Awareness Day provides an opportunity for us to reflect on practical ways to prevent overdose in our community. Overdose is preventable. Knowing the real facts about drugs and what to do when seeing someone experiencing and overdose DOES save lives. International Overdose Awareness Day events that aim to educate our communities about drugs can help; and

WHEREAS, August 31<sup>st</sup> is recognized in communities around the world as a day to remember individuals who were lost to drug overdose and to support their families and loved ones, and to take action towards ending preventable overdose deaths.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Peggy Malkin, Mayor of the Borough of Roosevelt, along with the Borough Council, do hereby proclaim August 31, 2024 as INTERNATIONAL OVERDOSE AWARENESS DAY in the Borough of Roosevelt, Monmouth County, State of New Jersey and urge all citizens to recognize that drug overdose is preventable and that everyone has a part to play. #### To the Roosevelt Borough Council:

As I am a member of the amphitheater committee and am unable to attend tonight's Council meeting, I would like the Council to have time to consider the following well before deciding about the committee's proposal. I have heard concerns about costs, and if the structure could be repaired rather than rebuilt.

According to the Structural Analysis Report, repair "is not a viable option". The report cites "vertical cracking typically indicative of uneven settling and/or shifting of ground below foundation", and horizontal cracking which "occurs by way of soil destabilization and can lead to complete wall collapse." Cracking is extensive throughout the structure. The report goes on to state that an attempt to repair would result in the need to replace most of the walls and does not make sense. So it seems that the condition of the amphitheater is hazardous, with risk of injury were any part of the structure to further crumble or collapse. In addition to possible injury, there would be considerable liability.

The cost of the project is considerable, and the committee has been mindful of the need to cut costs wherever possible. It has been suggested that the work might be done incrementally, but in addition to rebuilding the structure, the plan is to restore the wiring for lighting, for safety, and to make connections for sound and lighting accessible. It only makes sense to do the wiring in the course of reconstruction. A change to the structure is to top the seating rows with stone to prevent water damage. An alternative of poured concrete was considered, but would not be as durable and would cost about the same amount. Currently there is handicap access only to the top of the amphitheater, with no safe handicap access to the performance area. The plan includes a handicap accessible path to that area, which seems to me to be essential. There were many ideas of additional enhancements to the structure and landscape, met with continual efforts to eliminate anything not essential.

Others on the committee can explain the financial situation better than me, but I understand that the cost per household would be about \$7 per month. There is concern that although that would not be burdensome to many if not most of the community, there are those in precarious circumstances for whom any increase would be very difficult. To me that is a separate issue for which I hope the Council would offer whatever assistance possible. It would be helpful to gather and provide information about all available social services, maybe printed regularly in the Borough Bulletin. In particular, medical expenses are a concern, including possible ambulance expenses. That there are no ambulance charges should be well publicized.

Please consider this information and vote to rebuild the amphitheater. Respectfully,

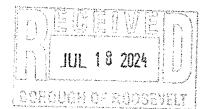

Thank you for your interest in the 2024 Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Program. The SRTS Program continues to be very popular and increasingly competitive. As a result, we regret that we are unable to fund many worthwhile projects each year. This year we received 61 applications totaling more than \$58.3 million. With \$21 million available for this year's program, we were able to fund 23 projects.

Unfortunately, the Improvements to Rochdale Avenue between Farm Lane and Homestead Lane project was not among those selected to receive funding. I encourage you to continue to pursue the goals of your community and reapply for the Safe Routes to School Program during the next solicitation. Staff of the Local Aid District office in your area remains available to work with you on any future applications. Please feel free to contact them directly with any questions or assistance you may need.

The Planning Board has requested that the recently adopted Stormwater Control Ordinance be modified to add greater restrictions than are required by the NJDEP. Creating an ordinance that is more restrictive than the NJDEP is allowable, and this has been confirmed by Planning Board Attorney Michelle Donato, Esq.

We are considering modifications that would add the definition of a minor development and require stormwater management for minor developments. We also intend to modify the ordinance to require greater volume control for major developments. This will help in reducing downstream flooding.

Our fee to perform the above will be a fee not to exceed \$2,800.00. We are able to move forward with this upon your authorization.

The following are notes from my review of the videos shot of the Lake Drive Collection system. I tried to note the areas where roots and cracks were present and also larger issues such as root masses and possible hole or clogged lateral in the collection pipes.

#### MH run #75 to #74

This section was not in bad shape. There were roots at 161', and some smaller roots at 379'. There was a belly in the pipe at 300 to 307 and another at 315' to 319'.

#### MH #76 to #75

There were cracks in the pipe at the following foot marks, 96', 141' (lg. crk.), 196', 430', 465'

There were roots, mostly at joints at the following foot markers, 1' thru 16', (small roots each joint), 117', 143', 202', 376' (large root mass), 386'. At 394', 401', & 411' there were large root masses and at 476' the root mass was so large we could not get through it. They went back in from the MH #75 to #76 to see what was past the root mass and hit it from the other side at 9.1".

#### MH #77 to #76

This section also had a lot of cracks and roots and at one point they had to re jet the pipe to get by the root mass. I am just listing the foot markers for where the problems were but is almost the entire length. There was a bad joint at 25'. There were cracks at 173', 210', 268', 325', 404', and 481'. I will star\*\* the foot markers where the roots were especially bad. Roots were found at almost 30% of the joints. Roots found at 25', 40'\*\*, 46', 87'\*\*, 118'\*\*, 146'\*\*, 149'\*\*, had trouble getting through, 296', 298', 303', 335'\*\* (also bad joint), 356', 360', 395', 421', 443', 446', 452', 464' and 472'.

#### MH #78 to #77

Another section with a lot of problems. There were cracks at the following foot markers, 59', 190', 330' and 422'. Roots were found at 0.2', 8', 29', 34', 36', 42', 63', 116', 166', 202'\*\*, 247', 254', 263', 311', 345', 435', 432' and 435'.

#### MH #79 to #78

Another bad section of piping. There was a crack along the first 30' of the pipe, 52', 136', 197', 234', 243', 254', 290', 305', 214', 324', 349', 355', 362', 390', 393', 407', and 470'. There were roots at 40', 44', 64', 72', 76'\*\*, 129'\*\*, 148', 173'\*\*, 226', and 493'. They had to re jet at the 129' mark because they could not get past the roots the first time through. There was a bad joint at 276'. Several of the laterals were clogged with roots.

#### MH #80 to #81

There were cracks at the following foot markers, 0.0', to 4', 23', also a bad joint, 29', 35', 38', 62', there were cracks at almost every joint from 70' through 127'. 148', 182', and 212'\*\*. There were roots at 133', 140', 142', 148', 182', 191', 196', 212', and 234'.

#### MH #81 to #82

There were numerous cracks from 12' to 32' and then at 107', 135', 186' and 195'. There were roots at 12' with a crack and hole in the pipe, 42', 45', 48', 54', 57', 71'\*\*, 74'\*\*, 77'\*\*, 87', 90', 96'\*\*, 107', 125', 131', 150', 153', 166', 169', at 161' there are laterals on both sides with large roots, 175'\*\*, looks like a capped lateral or hole, and 180'. There is a bad joint at about 120'.

#### MH#82 to #83

There were cracks in the pipes at 7', 34', 45', 59', 83', 86', 98', 182', 189', 195', 220', 225', 230', 237', and 285'. There were a lot of roots and several laterals clogged with roots at 90', 94', 98', 110'\*\*, 113'\*\*, 115'\*\* possible hole in pipe, 119'\*\* roots in a lateral, 120', 124', 129', 131', 136', 144', 157', 160', 168', 170', 175', 180', 195', 205"\*\*, lateral or hole in pipe, 245', 230', 237' 245', 252', and 258'.

This entire street is subject to root intrusion and needs to have this issue addressed as quickly as possible. I am surprised that the sewer is even flowing in some areas and some of the laterals appear to be completely clogged.

BOND ORDINANCE NO. 2024-08 INTRODUCED DATE: 07-01-2024 PUBLIC HEARING DATE: 08-05-2024

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE SOUTH VALLEY SEWER EMERGENCY PROJECT, APPROPRIATING \$189,000 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$180,000 BONDS AND NOTES TO FINANCE A PORTION OF THE COSTS THEREOF, AUTHORIZED IN AND BY THE BOROUGH OF ROOSEVELT, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, NEW JERSEY

- BE IT ORDAINED by the BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF ROOSEVELT, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, STATE OF NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring), AS FOLLOWS:
- Section 1. The improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are hereby authorized as Sewer Utility improvements to be undertaken in and by the Borough of Roosevelt, in the County of Monmouth, New Jersey (the "Borough"). For the improvements or purposes described in Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$189,000, said sum being inclusive of all appropriations heretofore made therefor, including \$9,000 as the down payment for said purposes as required by the Local Bond Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:2-1 et seq. The down payment is now available by virtue of provision for down payment or for capital improvement purposes in the Capital Improvement Fund of one or more previously adopted budgets.
- Section 2. In order to finance the costs of said improvements or purposes not provided for by the application of the down payment, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount not to exceed \$180,000, pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of the issuance of said bonds and to temporarily finance said improvements or purposes, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.
- Section 3. (a) The improvements hereby authorized and the purposes for which the obligations are to be issued consist of the South Valley Sewer Emergency Project, together with all purposes necessary, incidental or appurtenant thereto, all as shown on and in accordance with plans, specifications or requisitions therefor on file with or through the Borough Chief Financial Officer, as finally approved by the governing body of the Borough.
- (b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for the improvements or purposes described in Section 3(a) hereof is \$180,000, as stated in Section 2 hereof.
- (c) The estimated cost of the improvements or purposes described in Section 3(a) hereof is \$189,000, which is equal to the amount of the appropriation herein made therefor. The excess of the appropriation of \$189,000 over the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued therefor being the amount of said \$9,000 down payment for said purposes.

- Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer of the Borough, provided that no note shall mature later than one (1) year from its date. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:2-8. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief financial officer, who shall determine all matters in connection with notes issued pursuant to this ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. The chief financial officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The chief financial officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of such notes occurs, such report shall include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.
- Section 5. The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:
- (a) The improvements or purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are not a current expense and are improvements or purposes that the Borough may lawfully undertake as Sewer Utility improvements, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.
- (b) The average period of usefulness of the improvements or purposes, within the limitations of the Local Bond Law and taking into consideration the amount of the obligations authorized for said purposes, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is twenty (20) years.
- (c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk, and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. Such Statement shows that the gross debt of the Borough as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$180,000 and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by that Law.
- (d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$29,000 for interest on said obligations, costs of issuing said obligations, engineering costs, legal fees and other items of expense listed in and permitted under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-20 is included as part of the cost of said improvements and is included in the estimated cost indicated herein for said improvements.
- (e) To the extent that moneys of the Borough are used to finance, on an interim basis, costs of said improvements or purposes, the Borough reasonably expects such costs to be paid or reimbursed with the proceeds of obligations issued pursuant hereto. This ordinance shall constitute a declaration of official intent for the purposes and within the meaning of Section 1.150-2(e) of the United States Treasury Regulations.

- Section 6. The capital budget of the Borough is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. The resolution in the form promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services is on file with the Borough Clerk and is available there for public inspection.
- Section 7. Any grant or similar moneys from time to time received by the Borough for the improvements or purposes described in Section 3 hereof, shall be applied either to direct payment of the cost of the improvements within the appropriation herein authorized or to payment of the obligations issued pursuant to this ordinance. The amount of obligations authorized but not issued hereunder shall be reduced to the extent that such funds are received and so used.
- Section 8. The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Borough, and, unless paid from other sources, the Borough shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable property within the Borough for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation as to rate or amount.
- Section 9. This bond ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE FRANKLIN DELANO ROOSEVELT AMPHITHEATER PROJECT, APPROPRIATING \$710,000 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$676,000 BONDS AND NOTES TO FINANCE A PORTION OF THE COSTS THEREOF, AUTHORIZED IN AND BY THE BOROUGH OF ROOSEVELT, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, NEW JERSEY

BE IT ORDAINED by the BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF ROOSEVELT, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, STATE OF NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring), AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. The improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are hereby authorized as general improvements to be undertaken in and by the Borough of Roosevelt, in the County of Monmouth, New Jersey (the "Borough"). For the improvements or purposes described in Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$710,000, said sum being inclusive of all appropriations heretofore made therefor, including \$34,000 as the down payment for said purposes as required by the Local Bond Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:2-1 et seq. The down payment is now available by virtue of provision for down payment or for capital improvement purposes in the Capital Improvement Fund of one or more previously adopted budgets.
- Section 2. In order to finance the costs of said improvements or purposes not provided for by the application of the down payment, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount not to exceed \$676,000, pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of the issuance of said bonds and to temporarily finance said improvements or purposes, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.
- Section 3. (a) The improvements hereby authorized and the purposes for which the obligations are to be issued consist of the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Amphitheater Project, including, but not limited to, demolition, excavation, milling, paving, landscaping and lighting, together with all purposes necessary, incidental or appurtenant thereto, all as shown on and in accordance with plans, specifications or requisitions therefor on file with or through the Borough Chief Financial Officer, as finally approved by the governing body of the Borough.
- (b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued for the improvements or purposes described in Section 3(a) hereof is \$676,000, as stated in Section 2 hereof.
- (c) The estimated cost of the improvements or purposes described in Section 3(a) hereof is \$710,000, which is equal to the amount of the appropriation herein made therefor. The

excess of the appropriation of \$710,000 over the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes to be issued therefor being the amount of said \$34,000 down payment for said purposes.

- Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer of the Borough, provided that no note shall mature later than one (1) year from its date. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:2-8. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief financial officer, who shall determine all matters in connection with notes issued pursuant to this ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. The chief financial officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The chief financial officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of such notes occurs, such report shall include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.
- Section 5. The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:
- (a) The improvements or purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are not a current expense and are improvements or purposes that the Borough may lawfully undertake as general improvements, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.
- (b) The average period of usefulness of the improvements or purposes, within the limitations of the Local Bond Law and taking into consideration the amount of the obligations authorized for said purposes, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is twenty (20) years.
- (c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk, and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. Such Statement shows that the gross debt of the Borough as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$676,000 and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by that Law.
- (d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$20,000 for interest on said obligations, costs of issuing said obligations, engineering costs, legal fees and other items of expense listed in and permitted under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-20 is included as part of the cost of said improvements and is included in the estimated cost indicated herein for said improvements.
- (e) To the extent that moneys of the Borough are used to finance, on an interim basis, costs of said improvements or purposes, the Borough reasonably expects such costs to be paid or reimbursed with the proceeds of obligations issued pursuant hereto. This ordinance

shall constitute a declaration of official intent for the purposes and within the meaning of Section 1.150-2(e) of the United States Treasury Regulations.

- Section 6. The capital budget of the Borough is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. The resolution in the form promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services is on file with the Borough Clerk and is available there for public inspection.
- Section 7. Any grant or similar moneys from time to time received by the Borough for the improvements or purposes described in Section 3 hereof, shall be applied either to direct payment of the cost of the improvements within the appropriation herein authorized or to payment of the obligations issued pursuant to this ordinance. The amount of obligations authorized but not issued hereunder shall be reduced to the extent that such funds are received and so used.
- Section 8. The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Borough, and, unless paid from other sources, the Borough shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable property within the Borough for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation as to rate or amount.
- Section 9. This bond ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.
